TAMMUZ

Tammuz begins the summer months and fast days. The siege on Jerusalem has begun, G-d forbid. Our history is full of sieges on Jerusalem. Jerusalem was taken over 17 times throughout history.

We fast on the 17th of Tammuz. We read the Torah even on a day when the Torah is not usually read. We ask G-d for forgiveness. The theology is that we are at fault. We are guilty because we do not observe the Torah laws. G-d is not a reality for us as He should be. Therefore, during these days, we seek to return.

Tuesday, July 3rd is the 17th of Tammuz, the fast day, marking the breach in the Temple walls. The laws for fasting continue; restraint in occasions of joy. This continues for three weeks, climaxed by the 9th day of Av, a 25-hour fast. This year, this day is also on a Tuesday, July 24th. The fast begins on Monday night. We will have an evening service Monday night with the reading of Lamentations, G-d willing. ✪



BRATZLAVER REBBE

The Bratzlaver Rebbe was the great grandson of the Baal Shem Tov. When you say the name Baal Shem Tov, you stand. The Baal Shem Tov was the father of the Chassidic movement.

Reb. Nachman of Bratzlav taught a new level of attachment to G-d, D'vaikus. He was a role model of D'vaikus, cleaving to G-d through prayer, but with song and joy.

He married at 13. His scholarship was profound. Reb. Nachman attracted hundreds of students and then more. He was able to transmit his feelings of attachment to Hashem. He wrote music which his disciples carry forth even today. His literature is reprinted and studied. Legend has it that he has authored 42 books.

He was born in 1772; died in 1811.

Excerpt: Rejoice so much in a Commandment (Mitzvah) that you will desire no other reward in this world than the opportunity to do another Mitzvah.

More Joy: When you are filled with joy all day you can easily find an hour in which to pour out your heart before the Holy One Blessed Be He. When you are depressed it is very difficult to seclude yourself and speak to G-d. Therefore, do your best, even force yourself to be always happy, especially when you are praying. It is impossible to reach a true state of happiness except by removing every trace of self-importance, and not caring what others think of you. ✧

BENYOMIN OF TUDELA

Our traveler of Jewish sites has returned from Russia and Poland, specifically Uman, and even Cracow. But it's Uman for which he has snared us. Uman, the burial place of the Bratzlover, or sometimes called the Breslover, Rebbe.

The Bratzlaver Rebbe is one of the Chassidic greats. Bratzlav is a movement with thousands of ardent Chassidim worldwide. To refer to the Rebbe as a great is a contradiction in being. He was a servant of Hashem. He used a prayer book. However, what turned his pages was his joy.

In Uman there is a small synagogue by the grave site. Jews from all over the world come to this small gravesite. There is a hotel on the premises that is open only during the high holidays.

Our traveler describes the scene taking place when he was there. There was a Talis-covered man whose head and body was leaning on the wooden cover over the grave site. There was another man who seemed to be asleep, leaning over the wooden cover. The activity in and out was constant. Binyomin was told that there are visitors daily, a stream of Jews.

Over the cemetery there was a bridge for the Priests-Kohanim to ascend the area without being in the cemetery. Priests are not allowed to be in a cemetery except for immediate members of the family.

At the site, our seeker was told to recite ten Psalms, give Tzedaka, any amount. Then whatever your request, it will be fulfilled.

The sight of the vigorous Jews in their piety and awe was stirring for our traveler.

Wherever our seeker went, there were prayer books. There were Artscroll prayer books and prayer books in Russian.

Sightseeing is one thing. This was not sightseeing. This was active participation in the holy areas. Most significant is that these were Jews who were there in defiance of the Holocaust.

The Nazis had removed all known Jews from Uman and Bratzlov. There were not many, in the hundreds. The neighbors helped the Nazis round up the Jews; then the neighbors went into the homes and stole the possessions.

The possessions were of small consequence. The cemetery became a garbage dump. Someone marked the Rebbe's grave.

The irony is that the Poles living there cleaned up the cemetery. Each year thousands of visitors sustain a non-existent economy in Uman. ✧

We have had so many Mitzvot in June that it got me thinking about a few things. What is the real purpose of a synagogue? In Harry Kemelman's Rabbi Small mysteries, the author states that a shul's most important charge is to teach the children. Everything else takes a back seat. Indeed, he makes a point in each book that Rabbi means teacher and that is his most important duty. I agree. We are very grateful to have so many wonderful young Jewish scholars become Bar and Bat Mitzvah. We've had four celebrations in the last six weeks. It is our reason for being.

I think about my own Bar Mitzvah back in the day of hula hoops and dollar haircuts. When I was twelve and a half, Rabbi Kaminetsky decided I was ready to play the "Paladium." That's what we called the huge sanctuary. Bigger and scarier than the Paris Opera House in "Phantom" sans chandelier. I was aghast with fright. They say that most Americans prefer death to public speaking. That certainly was the way I felt.

For three long years I attended Hebrew School. It was two hours on Tuesday, two hours on Thursday and three hours on Sunday. My gentile friends were in awe. So much religious training, and yet I seemed just as godless as they were. Still I went without a fuss and paid as little attention as I had to. Actually Hebrew school was a safe haven, for as long as I was there I never gave a thought to the dreadedBAR MITZVAH!

At the end of my third year of Cheder, I began to take the lessons that would change my life forever...I would learn my haftorah. No small feat, either. Six hundred and fifty words of Hebrew to be read perfectly. Plus each syllable required its own unique inflection. One day I asked the Rabbi for a transla-

Ezer Mizion, the Israel Health Support Organization, offers an extensive range of medical and social support services to help Israel's sick, disabled, elderly and underprivileged populations. Since its founding in 1979, Ezer Mizion has grown to become one of the largest non-profit organizations in Israel, benefiting over half a million people every year.

This dynamic organization is continually looking for new ways to provide assistance and to help more people face their challenges. Since its establishment in 1998, their Bone Marrow Donor Registry has handled thousands of search requests from dozens of Transplant Centers in over 30 countries. To date Ezer Mizion's Registry has made 1,074 complete donor-patient matches that have facilitated 232 transplants and saved the lives of Jewish patients throughout the world!

Currently Ezer Mizion is able to match 40% of the requests received. Currently families are waiting in prayer for the perfect genetic match. More funding will result in an enlarged registry so that figure can grow. The tension at the Ezer Mizion office is thick. All ways and means to obtain funding are pursued. Jews everywhere are being asked to contribute so that genetic testing can be done and the lives of so many be saved...so that the transplants be done before it's too late.

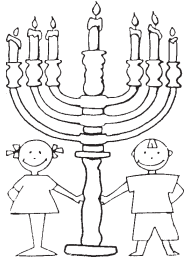

tion. He looked uncomfortable. I had read the English version many times but didn't get it. It started out, "Shout, O barren that thou didst not bear." My older brother explained that G-d was saying in my haftorah that kids were nothing but heartache and don't complain if you never have any. What a lesson to learn at 12 years old.

I took a 45-minute lesson everyday for two summer months. My big day was September 8. Just before the family vacation Rabbi Kaminetsy told me I'd be leading the service. "Here, learn this," he said as he handed me a pencil marked Siddur. The blood drained from my face and my stomach floated toward heaven. "I don't think I can," I squeaked. Of course you can and you will," he said. The next day we went on our family vacation. I studied a little and worried a lot. I prayed to G-d three times a day to get me through this. I couldn't sleep. I couldn't eat. It was the worst vacation of my life. When we returned the Bar Mitzvah was bearing down on me like a freight train. Reading Hebrew in front of hundreds of people. I wanted to disappear. There seemed to be no one to confide in. My parents were busy planning the party. My brothers were like sharks. If they sensed fear in me they would move in for a "kill." I knew I had to do this without anyone's help. I marked time like a prisoner waiting for his execution.

The big day came. I had rehearsed so much that the words magically came out without even thinking. The first words were tough, "Rahnee akarah, lo yahaudah..." The rest just poured out. I couldn't stop if I wanted to. It was as if I was watching someone else recite my haftorah. Halfway through I remember liking the rapt attention everyone was paying. I thought, "this is fun." I slowed down a little, so I could be in the spotlight a little longer. My brothers' and my friends' mouths were frozen open in disbelief. Afterward I read my English speech that the Rabbi gave me thanking my parents and showing false humility. My heart was racing. I felt so relieved that this stage of my life was completed. Relieved andcould it be?...Sad. Thank you G-d, for carrying me through my coming of age, my Bar Mitzvah. ☆

This is your student. I am so sorry that I missed your class today. We forgot about the new schedule. I hope this does not create a problem! See you tomorrow!

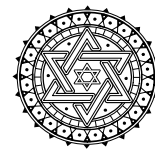
Dear Rabbi,
