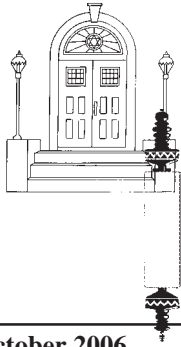

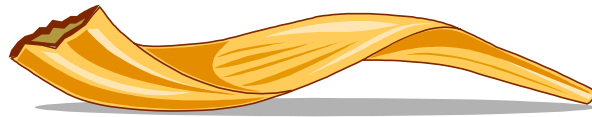

At the end of the meeting Rabbi gave us his take on the religious challenge by the local Imam and the Frederick News-Post. Since the article appeared, the Pope has kindly stepped in and taken the heat off Rabbi Kosman. Good work Your Holiness!

Rosh Hashanah is here and I am going to apply the Anglo custom of making a New Year's resolution in regards to all things Beth Sholom. I am going to try to answer my most frequently asked questions as shul President.

First question, when is my term over? Answer: June of '08. Now I have a question for you. Whazza matter? Can't you wait?

Second, is the congregation being sued? Answer: No. However, a claim is being made against our insurance company for an enormous sum of money. In my opinion, and that of the insurance company, the claim is frivolous and will not be enforced.

Third, when is Rabbi Kosman going to retire? I can't answer that. He loves his job and he is still good at it. Rabbi is an excellent teacher. Then the boy next to him said, "He's reading it off the blackboard behind you!" "Very good, sort of," I said.

Principal Chaya Schneider stopped in and told me that it was time to return to the 6th and 7th graders. The kindergarten room was the stop-off place for the snacks. I read the directions: One snack, one drink per child.

Dismissal at 11:30 to the park for the picnic.

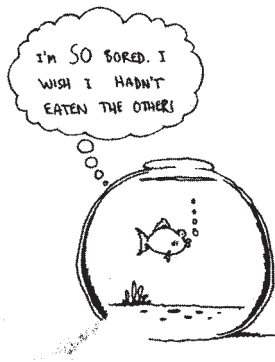

WALKERSVILLE CLASS

We were about to take our seats. Martha Zweig forgot her knitting. It's a short walk to her home and back. I have two sweaters, maybe three, that have been knitted during the Walkersville class. Over the years our class has built an impressive library of Jewish books. And, what is really important, we have read the books during class. I think that Rabbi Wein's "Triumph and Survival" took us three years. It is a huge and heavy work.

Jim Lewin gave me a "must read" book. We began reading that book. Once I know that we will go with the book then the class will purchase copies.

We read several books by Chaim Shapiro, A.H., a Baltimore writer. Then we invited him to the class. Fred Berney taped the interview. After Chaim Shapiro died, I gave his wife copies of the interview. She was very grateful. I don't believe I ever transmitted her appreciation to Fred. Chaim Shapiro's major work, *Go, My Son* probably took us three years to read.

Mr. Shapiro writes that Russian peasants told him that if an infant were left in the wild without human contact, the language he would begin to speak was Hebrew.

In his book, *The Shtetl*, he has a true character who ran a hardware store. He had seven sons. Each morning, the sons would have to show their dad their arms to prove they had put on Tfillin. The indentation from the armstraps would still be visible. ☆

WARREN BUFFET INTERVIEWED

"How did you suddenly decide to invest in Iscar in Israel?"

WB. "I met with the CEO and CFO. They met with Charlie Munger. He's the type of guy who doesn't get excited about anyone but he was excited about them. He sat with them until midnight. He doesn't even sit with me until midnight."

"What prompted you to invest in Iscar?"

WB. "It is an amazing company run by amazing people. I don't get opportunities to invest in companies like that."

"This is your first investment outside of the United States."

WB. "True, and it is also the third largest ever made by Berkshire."

"Weren't you hesitant about investing in a company whose entire staff and production is in Israel?"

WB. "When you invest in a company that is doing something necessary, and doing it all over the world, it is not risky."

"What does that say about Israel?"

WB. "That you have amazing people. We are investing \$4 billion in an amazing group of people from Israel-and we are investing at an astounding speed. This is what we think about the company."

"You are investing \$4 billion in Israel without visiting the manufacturing plant?"

WB. "What matters is the people, the management. Buying a company is like a marriage-it's for life. We are very dependent on these people and I am very happy to be depending on them."

"Do you believe in Israel, or only in the company Iscar?"

WB. "A great many of my friends identify strongly with Israel. My wife has been to Israel several times. I don't know how many. If it has problems with terror, the U.S. probably also has problems. I will most likely go to Israel in the fall."

"Are you afraid of the rise of Hamas, or the increase in terrorism?"

WB. "There are hazards everywhere in the world. We saw that on September 11. It's a dangerous world. It will always be a dangerous world. Weapons of mass destruction are a genie that cannot be returned to the bottle. The world has to learn to cope with it. Israel knows how to cope with it better because it has always been so close."

"How will you make sure that the best management stays at Iscar?"

WB. "Why am I managing Berkshire? I'm already 75. The answer is that I enjoy it. I love it. There is nothing I would rather do than come to the office at Berkshire each morning. I feel like Michelangelo painting the ceiling of the Sistine Chapel. The people of Iscar are like that too. They feel that same excitement toward their company, and I have to make sure not to tamper with that."

"Do you think that Berkshire's ownership of Iscar will help it continue to develop in the world?"

WB. "Look what the company has done so far - it doesn't need me."

"How long will you hold on to Iscar?"

WB. "Forever. I'm not selling. Ever."

"Are you considering any other companies in Israel?"

WB. "I want you to tell your readers that if they know of a company similar to Iscar, even slightly, they should let me know immediately - I want to buy it. They can call me collect."

"What do you expect from Iscar? How significant is that company to a huge enterprise like Berkshire?"

WB. "In five or ten years when we look back, we will understand that what we announced here this morning is one of the most significant things that Berkshire Hathaway has ever done. Iscar will be a very big and important company." ☆

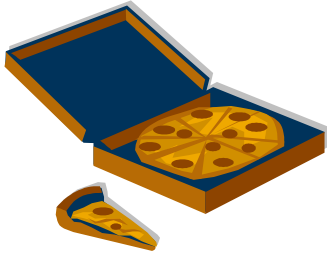

Early Childhood Center

4-year-old classes

Not surprisingly, parents bringing their children to Beth Sholom Early Childhood Center in 2006 encounter a very different scene than those who enrolled their children over a quarter of a century ago. The growth of our school has literally paralleled Frederick County's growth during this time.

Approximately 26 years ago, Rabbi Kosman asked Jill Sacks, a lady he knew from Baltimore, to direct a preschool at Beth Sholom. She became the first teacher/director, and the class was held in the basement of the downtown synagogue. It was a single class of a handful of three-year-olds. Jill moved away a few years later, and Rabbi Kosman then asked Gayle Bromberg to direct the school. During Gayle's tenure, David Finkelstein's sister Sarah became the teacher, still teaching one class, again consisting of four or five students. Following Sarah, a lady named Connie from Baltimore taught, and then a Hood student took the helm. A few years later, Leslie Zahler served briefly as director and during this time, the preschool added a second class. (I wish I could be more specific with names and dates to extend the justice these wonderful teachers and directors deserve, but there is no official documentation.) During Gayle's directorship, she was instrumental in establishing the Beth

Sholom Board of Education, and also got our preschool involved with the Board of Jewish Education in Baltimore. Both of these moves greatly assisted the quality of our preschool, and promoted much positive growth. Thank you, Gayle!

Enter Naomi Lazerow, 11 years ago, as the new director. During this time, our preschool expanded year by year. We went from offering classes three times a week, to five times a week. We went from offering classes only to three- and four-year-olds, to adding classes for two-year-olds, and a kindergarten. Today, 26 years later, we have grown from one class, to the following: four two-year-old classes, three three-year-old classes, three four-year-old classes, and a kindergarten, totaling 125 children!

None of this could have been accomplished without the love and dedication of all those who have directed and taught at the Early Childhood Center. We have also benefited greatly from the Beth Sholom Board of Education members, many of whom are professionals in the education field. Thanks to everyone who has helped make our school the success it is! Each day our students enter a loving, nurturing environment that offers a myriad of opportunities for them to develop their social, spiritual, academic, and physical skills. It is our goal here at Beth Sholom Early Childhood Center to provide these children with a top-notch early education program that will instill a life-long love of learning and Judaism! ☆

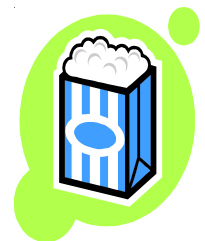

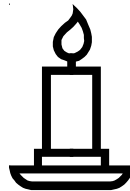

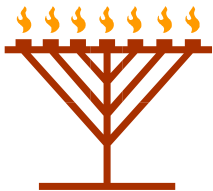
