Slichot Program

up to Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur.
Experience it with us in prayer,
learning, and a challenging document-
ary on one man's struggle with G-d.



Rosh Hashanah

Rosh Hashanah, the Jewish new year, is a fall holiday, taking place at the beginning of the month of Tishrei, which is actually the seventh month of the Jewish year (counting from Nissan in the spring). It is both a time of rejoicing and of serious introspection, a time to celebrate the completion of another year while also taking stock of one's life.

History

The origins of Rosh Hashanah may be sought in a royal enthronement ritual of biblical times, though the Bible itself never mentions the "New Year" or "Day of Judgment" aspects of the holiday. Even though Rosh Hashanah falls in the seventh month, later rabbinic tradition decided to designate it the beginning of the year. Although the origin of this tradition may have been adopted from the Babylonians, the rabbis imbued it with Jewish significance as the anniversary of the day on which the world was created, or of the day on which humanity was created. Another explanation can be found in the significance of Tishrei as the seventh month, hence the Sabbath of the year.

At Home

The challah (traditional bread) that is eaten for the Rosh Hashanah season is round, symbolizing the eternal cycle of life. The challah is traditionally dipped in honey, symbolizing the hopes for a sweet New Year. The same is done with apples, which are made even sweeter with the addition of honey.

In the Community

Three unique sets of prayers are added to the morning service during Rosh Hashanah. These are known as Malkhuyot, which address the sovereignty of G-d, Zikhronot, which present G-d as the one who remembers past deeds, and Shofarot, in which we stand in nervous anticipation of the future. Each of these sections culminates in the blasts of the Shofar, the most potent symbol of the holiday. The shofar is alluded to in the most memorable Torah reading for the holiday, the Akedah or Binding of Isaac. The story and the shofar serve as reminders of the covenant between G-d and the people of Israel, carrying with them the message of sacrifice, hope, and continuity.

Theology and Themes

This is the time of year during which we are to atone for both our individual--and on Yom Kippur, our communal--sins committed over the course of the previous year, before Hashem literally closes the books on us and inscribes our fates for the coming year. G-d's rule over humanity and our need to serve Him are stressed time and again over the course of the holiday. ✨

Tashlich

Tashlich is a ritual traditionally observed on the first day of Rosh HaShanah. "Tashlich" means "casting off" in Hebrew and involves symbolically casting off the sins of the previous year into a body of flowing water, which carries them away. In this way the participant hopes to start the New Year with a clean slate.

Join us on Thurs., Sept. 9 in this ritual that dates back to at least the 15th century. We will meet at the covered bridge in Baker Park at 5 p.m.



Yom Kippur

Yom Kippur ("Day of Atonement") is the tenth day of the month of Tishrei. It is often considered the holiest day of the Jewish year. This day of fasting, prayer, and introspection begins with Kol Nidre, a prayer that asks for absolution from vows, and ends with the Ne'ilah service. In between is a liturgy that runs the emotional gamut, from the solemn to the celebratory.

This year (5771/2010-2011) Yom Kippur begins on Friday evening, September 17, and continues until Saturday night, September 18, 2010.

The major theme of Yom Kippur, as its name implies, is atonement. The source for much of our observance of Yom Kippur is Leviticus 23:26-28 - "God spoke to Moses, saying: Mark, the tenth day of this seventh month is the Day of Atonement. It shall be a sacred occasion for you: you shall practice self-denial, and you shall do no work throughout that day for it is a Day of Atonement, on which expiation is made on your behalf before the Lord your G-d."

The requirement to "practice self-denial" is interpreted in the Talmud to mean the following five prohibitions: eating, drinking, bathing, sexual relations, using bath oils and lotions, etc., and wearing leather shoes. ✨

Sukkot

Beginning five days after Yom Kippur, Sukkot is named after the booths or huts in which Jews are supposed to dwell during this week-long celebration, representing the huts in which the Israelites dwelt during their forty years of wandering in the desert after escaping from slavery in Egypt. The festival of Sukkot is one of the three great pilgrimage festivals of the Jewish year.

At Home

Many of the most popular rituals of Sukkot are practiced in the home. As soon after the conclusion of Yom Kippur as possible, often on the same evening, one is enjoined to begin building the sukkah, or hut, that is the central symbol of the holiday. The sukkah is a flimsy structure with at least three sides, whose roof is made out of thatch or branches, which provides some shade and protection from the sun, but also allows the stars to be seen at night. It is traditional to decorate the sukkah and to spend as much time in it as possible. Weather permitting, meals are eaten in the sukkah, and the hardier among us may also elect to sleep in the sukkah. In a welcoming ceremony called ushpizin, ancestors are symbolically invited to partake in the meals with us. And in commemoration of the bounty of the Holy Land, we hold and shake four species of plants (arba minim), consisting of palm, myrtle, and willow (lulav), together with citron (etrog).

In the Community

As with all festivals, services play an important role in the communal celebration of Sukkot. In addition to special festival readings, including Psalms of Praise (Hallel), on Sukkot additional prayers are included in the service asking G-d to save us (hoshana, from which we get the English word hosanna). During the Hoshana prayers, congregants march around the synagogue sanctuary holding the lulav and etrog. The seventh and last day of the festival is called Hoshanah Rabba, the "Great Hoshana." ☆

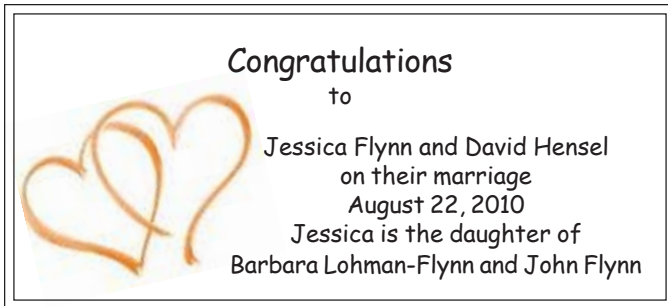

Acidophilus from health food store

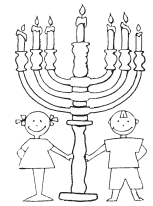

G'Mach / G'News

A couple of years ago the G'Mach committee combined with the Chessed Committee and altered our function considerably. We are no longer a small group whose sole purpose is to provide relief from financially distressing situations.

Our present organization has many functions. Some require only a telephone call or a card recognizing special events such as illnesses, religious conversions, marriages and engagements, births, etc.

Others require considerably more attention. These include providing help, services or food for homebound members, either temporarily or permanently, and providing whatever service is needed for those who unfortunately experience a death, major tragedy or a major illness in the family.

Some congregants require simple repairs in and around their homes. We are available to help, e.g. move a bookcase, change a light bulb, take some stuff to the dump, move light furniture, rake leaves, etc. We could take a look at something and let you know what to do to remedy the problem.

We assist with food for shiva and will accommodate your desired kashruth. We can deliver food to homes after shiva to provide a meal once your support systems have returned home. It is our goal to ensure that you are cared for and comforted during your grief. We want to accommodate your needs and want you to know that the Beth Sholom community cares about you.

Illness support - Through Beth Sholom G'mach, people who have been ill can get help if they let the office know they would like assistance. We have been able to provide meals, hospital and in-home visits, as well as phone calls to those in need. If you have the time to put an extra casserole in your freezer, or can run to the store for a sick congregant please call the office and add your name to our list of helpers. We also appreciate donations to G'mach to help pay for food and other needs of the congregation. G'Mach Illness support, led by Susan Dwyer, is a group solely devoted to helping membership in need. Please consider helping us lend a hand to other congregants.

Carolyn Snyder is working on finding an interpreter for a hearing impaired congregant for High Holiday services.

At our last meeting one of our rabbis mentioned that many of the synagogues in Baltimore are requiring that congregants requesting funds provide all the required information on a form. Simy Buckwold is canvassing synagogues in hopes of developing a standard form for this service.

Please remember that G'mach funds come from contributions to the G'mach fund. If you are considering making a donation please keep the G'mach in mind. ☆
